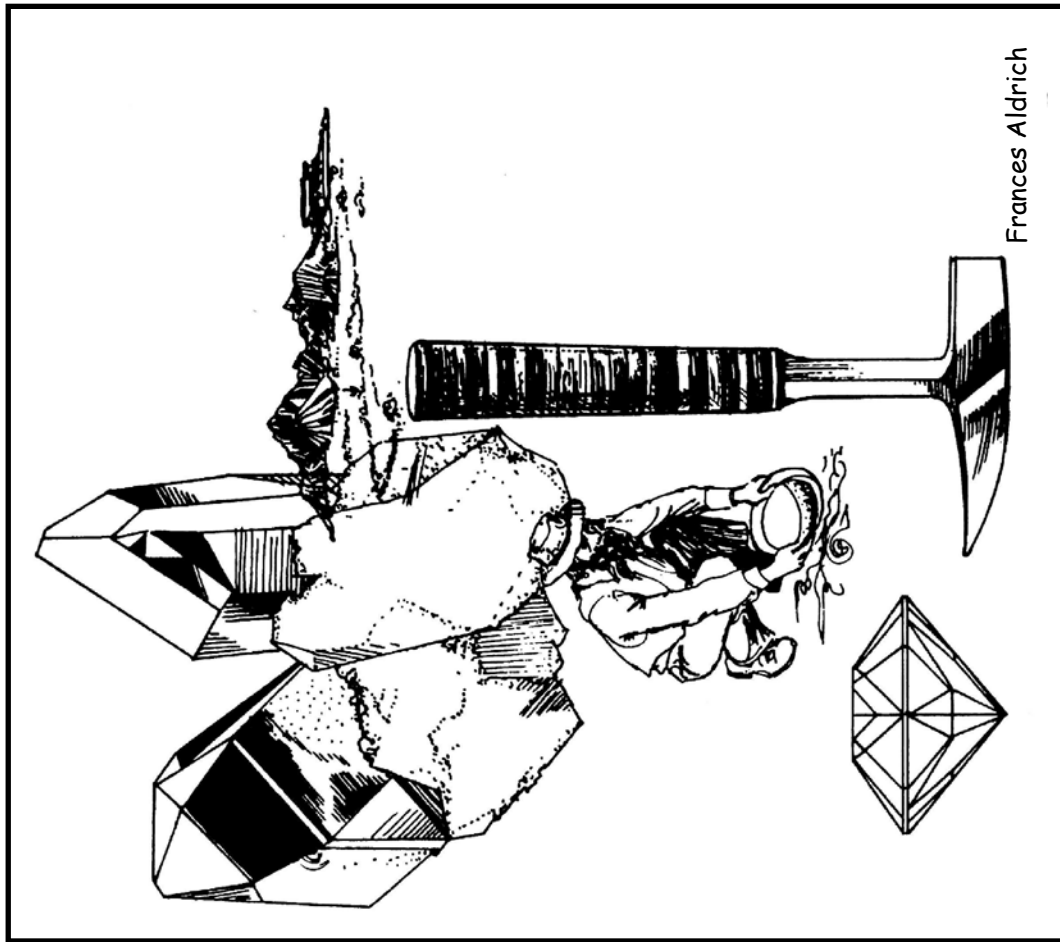

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

All the numbers are not yet in, but we'll have them in time for the August meeting. To all the members who shed a little (or a lot of) sweat, my hat is off to you. To those members who came only to see if their numbers would get them a prize, well that's another story. Speaking of prizes, one of our most hard working members won the grand prize of \$100: Sue Acosta. Your Club thanks all of those members who donated or sold their tickets as the total came to around \$900 from members alone, with one member donating \$90 to the cause. With the added amount donated from public sales, the net amount to be donated to the Culver City Schools will be about \$1000. We're giving the schools 90 percent of the proceeds (we're only allowed to use 10 percent for buying prizes by law) so it's not like its going into our pockets. could have used more. Sue's grab bag making crew did a great job. We just had an exceptional amount of sales this year.

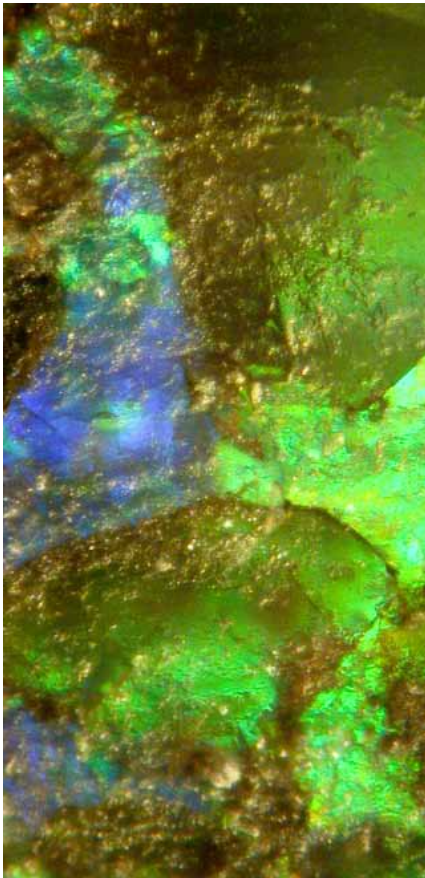

A sampling of Bruce Mensinger’s images.

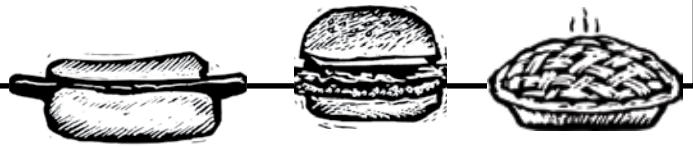

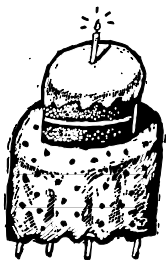
During our show we had two new members: Jan Ferguson and Zahava Dembowich join. We also had one renewal Marilyn Matthews.

Saws

Repairs to the 16-inch slab saw are well begun as I write this (July 17). The 16- and 18-inch saws both need the same work. This is no surprise; they are both Highland Park saws of nearly the same age and design. I anticipate a much quicker repair because the Fiesta of Gems show is done and the Venice High machine shop is available, so I will have more time and resources to bring to the work.

Picnic Silent Auction

Saturday, August 28 is our Club picnic.

In addition to food and socializing, we have a Silent Auction. Once again, the shop will bring items, setup and run the auction. Members are encouraged to bring donations (rocks, jewelery, equipment, tools, artwork, etc) to add to the auction. All proceeds from the Auction go to the club.

For those of you who are new to silent auctions here are some of the details of how we proceed:

- Silent auctions are not silent. The 'silent' is in contrast to the more familiar 'call-out' auction. Bidding takes place by writing your bid and name on a bid sheet below any previous bid.
- All the items at auction are arranged on tables, one or several in a group, along with a bid sheet for each item or group.
- Bid sheets briefly describe the item or items. The first line for bidding may have a minimum bid listed, otherwise the minimum bid is 25 cents.
- The auction begins when the auctioneer announces that the auction has begun. Bidders go from item

to item bidding on as many items as they choose. When someone else has placed a bid on an item you want, make a higher bid (at least 25 cents higher) by writing your higher bid and name on the next line of the bid sheet. As bidding continues, popular items accumulate many lines of successively higher bids, until the auctioneer announces that the auction has closed. Do not add a bid after closing!

- Go to each item and collect all that you have won and the bid sheet for each. Take them to the cashier, add-up the total, pay and enjoy your winnings.
