SHARING

Sharing is 'built-into' the core values that allow our club to exist and function. Most obvious is our shared interest in rocks and minerals. But there are myriad others. We share our knowledge and experience about where to find and how to work with these materials, our enthusiasm and our stories of all the finding, making and doing. We volunteer to make the Fiesta of Gems, the August picnic, and the Holiday party happen each year. Five times each week the lapidary shop and library are open. These are, each and every one, possible because we cooperate and share in the responsibility of operating these enterprises.

Focusing on the lapidary shop, this facility and the tools it contains are assets shared by all members who use them. In turn, all shop users are required to share in the maintenance of the facility and tools. While some maintenance requires specialized knowledge and skill, general house-keeping and cleaning-up after using tools and machines is required of every user every time. As part of the agreement, that everyone must agree to and sign anew each year, is that you have read and agree to abide by the shop rules which

clearly require that users, one-and-all, help with cleanup.

In addition, the shop is limited to the equipment on hand and in safe working order. Especially when the shop is crowded, users are expected to limit their use of resources so as to accommodate as many users as possible.

Some members have made the erroneous assumption that because there are fees for use of the shop and ad-



ditional charges for some equipment, that they are renting and thus entitled to use all they are willing to pay for. The shop fees are based on experience of the cost of the equipment and are collected to repair and replace what wears out. Also, to buy new equipment as

technology or usage dictates. No-one is paid, all instructors and repair-persons are volunteers.

As shop chairman I have tried to make 'the shop experience' safe, pleasant and productive for all users; especially for beginners and you who are trying out a new direction in your lapidary experience. Please recognize that the use of the shop is a shared experience, not a competition or a contest of who can hog the most resources.

A Beryl of Monkeys

New England produces some of the world's largest specimens of this mineral, and New Hampshire has given it the honor of State Mineral. Beryl is also a common sight in some recent tourmaline mine pockets, due to where it is found. Beryl is often found in pegmatites, but it may also be found in mica schist and limestone in certain localities.

Beryl ranges from a 7.5 to an 8 on the Mohs hardness scale, and it has a specific gravity of 2.76 on average. It has a vitreous luster, and its streak is white. It is sometimes fluorescent, and will fluoresce yellow, light blue, purple, pink, or red. It has approximately eight varieties, all named according to their color.

The blue varieties are called aquamarine and maxixe, with the deeper blue varieties going by the latter. Some of the finest specimens of aquamarine come from Russia; however, it may also be found in the United States, Brazil, Colombia, Zambia, Madagascar, Malawi, Tanzania and Kenya. When maxixe is exposed to the sun or heat treatments, it often loses its color. This can be returned using irradiation; the same method can be used to imitate maxixe using other varieties of beryl.

The green variety is hugely popular, and is known as emerald. They have been mined since ancient times in

Egypt, Austria, and India. They are generally quite brittle, as emeralds are commonly included. A rare variety, found in the mines of Colombia, exhibits a star pattern and is called a 'trapiche' emerald. Due to its popularity, there are two ways of making it using synthetic processes, hydrothermal and flux-growth.

Pale yellow to golden beryls are called golden beryl. They are also sometimes referred to as heliodor, but heliodor is more commonly the greenish-yellow shades of beryl. The



colorless variety is called goshenite, after its original point of discovery, in Massachusetts. In the past, it was sometimes used to make eyeglass lenses, due to its transparent nature.

Morganite is a rare variety that occurs in light pink to rose. It can also be referred to as 'pink beryl', 'rose beryl', 'pink emerald', and 'cesian/caesian beryl'. It was first discovered on

Madagascar in 1910, and has since been identified in the Pala district of California. It was named after J.P. Morgan by the New York Academy of Sciences. A 50 pound specimen was recovered in Maine in 1989. The final (described here, at least) variety is known as red beryl, or 'red/scarlet emerald'. It was first described in 1904 in Utah. It used to be referred to as bixbite, but this usage has been deprecated because it was being confused with bixbyite.

BENCH TIPS

JUST A LITTLE BENCH TIP:

- The little 3" square steel bench block gets plenty of use and abuse. When I started to see scars on the face of my block I grabbed one of the magnetic 3" square advertisement (usually from lawyers) from the front of the new phone book and stuck it on the best side of the block. After a couple of years the block has one pristine (almost) side and one side that shows all the fun I've been having. When I need/want good, I still have it.

HOLDING SMALL ITEMS FOR DRILLING:

When drilling a small hole into a small piece, many folks try to hold the piece by hand. But if the drill sticks, the piece will start to spin and possibly slice your finger. Hav-



ing done this occasionally in my younger days, I avoid band-aids now by using flat-jaw pliers to hold small pieces on the edge of the bench

pin or on a piece of wood when using the drill press.

RESHAPING SILICONE WHEELS

- Silicone polishing wheels in the Dremel or Foredom are a great time saver, but after using them a bit they often need to be reshaped. This is particularly true with the knife edge shaped wheels.

The natural thought is to grab one of your files and hold it up against the rotating wheel to reshape it. But this gives you a problem. The grinding grit in the silicone wheel is much harder than steel, meaning that you end up grinding down the teeth of your file.

The best way to reshape your polishing wheels is to use a diamond file. If you don't have one and must use a steel file, I sacrifice the area of the file that is closest to the handle because it's never used in normal benchwork.

The California Federation of Mineralogical Societies plays a big part in monitoring proposed laws which may affect rock hounding on public lands. The September CFMS Newsletter includes three articles related to how our government is affecting our hobby and what we can do.

In his monthly message, CFMS President Jin Brace-Thompson urges us to "Spread Facts, Not Confusion" and illustrates this with a recent thread of messages which appeared on the Yahoo Group LA-Rocks concerning group activities on BLM lands.

Another article lists numerous proposed bills concerning public lands. Do you want our elected officials to adopt policies for reasonable multi-use of public lands? This article gives ways your voice can be heard.



A third article describes the proposed California bill which will close 70 state parks including the Mining and Mineral Museum in Mariposa. Again, information is provided on how you can give your input.

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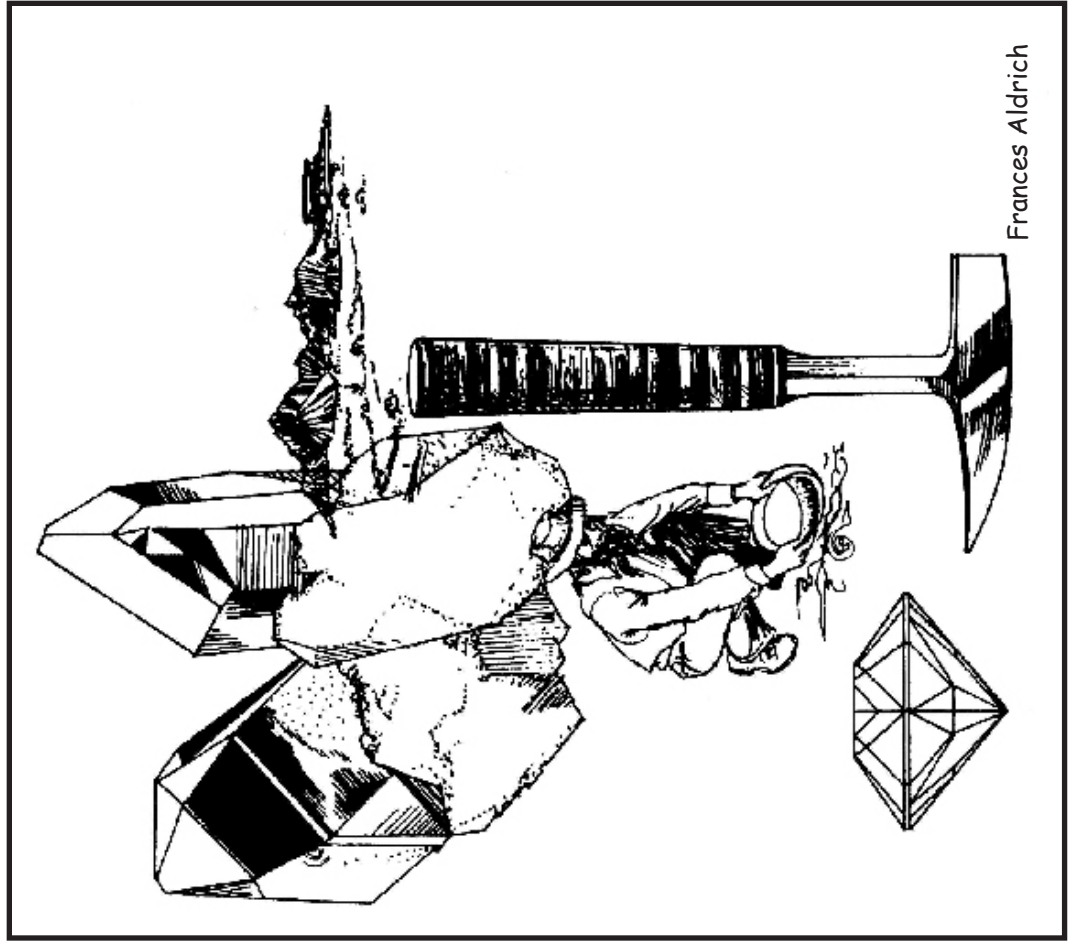
