### **SHOP NEWS**

### Shop schedule

Due to vacations, attendance of Quartsite and Tuscon, and personal events the shuffling of instructors will continue through February. While no shop closures are anticipated, the reduction in the number of available instructors makes it more likely that the shop may occasionally be closed. # **Equipment Availability**

As of January 17 (as I write this report) all shop equipment is in good working order.

### **Projects update**

- 1) Trim saws oil mist: Current thinking favors replacing the present exhaust fan with two kitchen range exhaust hoods to be located over the trim saws.
- 2) New oil test in one slab saw and one trim saw. The new-candidate-oil allergy tests and odor testing continue to be satisfactory. Misting has been greater than previously. Further testing of blade life in additional saws will begin soon (see 4 below).
- 3) Entry step was further improved with the addition of a bright yellow stripe.
- 4) The oil leak in 24-inch saw hydraulic pump will be repaired as part of the new oil test.
- 5) The #3 grind wheel station drive belt was replaced. This required complete dismantling of the arbor with the aid of some tools that we don't have at the shop such as my 12 ton press. Refurbishment involved some lathe work, a new pulley and some blacksmith and sheet metal work. The motor mount is temporary, but stable, as I write this.

### Call for volunteers.

Jette Sorensen is leading a shop beautification and clean-up initiative. Its main goals are repair and replacement of water damaged ceiling panels, painting, and evaluation of what equipment to keep. ### Construction

The main remaining construction is installation of rain gutters, installing irrigation and sod in front of the Scout House (please, stay on the walkways), additional asphalt sealer



and, optionally, a lockable gate to block entry to the aisle between the City Gardens and our storage sheds. Graffiti on exterior walls has returned now that the construction fence is gone.

Limited parking in back of the shop is open for use again. Park on the asphalt, off the alley concrete to avoid a parking citation. Please respect the space reserved for the shop instructor next to the paddle-tennis court.

# 2014 CFMS SHOW OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUR CLUB

This year, the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies (CFMS) show and convention will be held May 30th thru June 1st at the Pomona Fairground Fairplex. The Pasadena Lapidary Society will be the host club, but all CFMS clubs are encouraged to participate.

Since our Fiesta of Gems is 4 weeks later, June 28 & 29, we could get great advertising if we participate with:

- 1. A Display Case. Applications for Non-competitive display cases are due by April 25th. We could either do a display case based around the theme of our show "Rubies and Emeralds" (which could include some of the raffle prizes) or a collection which displays the whole range of interests of our members. We would need 1 key volunteer to help design the case and to collect items loaned by members. It would help if someone who doesn't work during the week could volunteer to set up the case on Thursday. I would volunteer to take the case down on Sunday.
- 2. Have a Demonstration table. There will be 10 demonstration stations with a total of 60 shifts: Friday 10 am to 1:30pm, Friday 1:30 pm to 5 pm, Saturday 10 am to 1:30 pm, Saturday 1:30 pm to 5 pm, Sunday 10 am to 1:30 pmand Sunday 1:30 to 4 pm. ### **BENCH TIPS**

### **MODIFYING PLIERS**


Sometimes a few changes to your tools can significantly improve productivity and quality at the same time. Stock tools can be customized and improved using standard jewelry skills.

Here's an example:

Making jump rings and weaving them into chainmaile designs involves a lot of opening and closing of the rings. I typically use two square jaw pliers to do this, one for each hand. But sometimes the rings would slip out of the pliers, getting scratched, and requiring extra cleanup time.



I solved the problem by forming a groove at the end of the jaw that would grasp the ring gently without scratching it. Use a triangular file or cutoff disk to cut the grooves about 1.5 mm back from the tip. Then to make the grooves round so they grasp the wire without distorting it, close the jaws and run a drill through the opening formed by the two rough grooves. Start with a small drill and follow up with a drill just



slightly smaller than the wire size you want to grip. In my case that was 14 gauge wire, so I chose a #53 drill. Finally, polish the grooves with a rubberized disk.

### MANAGING PRODUCTION

Many readers of these BenchTips sell their jewelry at shows, in galleries or online. They are sole proprietors and constantly under pressure to design new pieces and make enough product to keep up with demand. So their options are few when a large order comes in. They can burn the midnight oil themseves, or they can be smart and get some temporary help. But you need good help, and you often need it fast.

Jewelry assemblers are skilled, trustworthy and reliable craftsmen who make it their business to help others handle overloads and meet deadlines. Flexible arrangements are possible, working by the job, by the hour or by the piece. Each has a different mix of skills, from fabrication to enameling, casting, stonesetting, lapidary and others.

Assemblers are known to the trade, so you may have to ask around to find some references. But some assemblers advertise on the Net. For instance, a good friend of mine, Janice Metz <JenFT4@aol.com>, has been working with designers and fabricators in the West Los Angeles area since 1997. She specializes in silversmithing, wire-wrapping, beading and stringing.

### MINERAL REPORT

### Not a New Element... or is it?

Vanadinite is a mineral of the apatite group, uncommonly found in lead ore deposits. It is commonly associated with mimetite, pyromorphite, wulfenite, anglesite, calcite, and barite. Its crystals usually occur in short hexagonal prisms, but may also be hexagonal pyramids, rounded masses, or crusts.

Vanadinite is around a 3-4 on the Mohs scale of hardness, with a specific gravity of 6.95. Its color ranges through bright red, orange-red, red-brown, brown, yellow, gray, and colorless. Its streak is brownish yellow, and it is quite brittle.



It can be found across the world, in countries such as Austria, Spain, Scotland, South Africa, Argentina, and Mexico. Within the United States, it can be found in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, and South Dakota.

Vanadinite is one of the major industrial ore sources for elemental vanadium, along with carnotite and roscoelite. It is smelted down to vanadium pentoxide, and then reduced with calcium to result in pure vanadium. Occasionally, it is also used as a source of lead, because vanadium is 73.15% lead by weight.

It was first discovered in Mexico in 1801, by a mineralogist named Andrés Manuel del Rio. He thought he had discovered an entirely new element, and named the ore "brown lead." However, he was led to believe that his "new element" was merely impure chromium. In 1830, however, Nils Gabriel Sefstrom discovered a new element and named it vanadium, later confirming that it was identical to del Rio's discovery.
