MAY WORKSHOPS

LAPIDARY 101

Sunday, May 18, 9 am to 12 noon at the club's Lapidary Shop.

Get to know the equipment at the club's lapidary workshop. Use a trim saw to cut the outline for a cabochon. Shape the stone on the grinding wheels and use the Expando wheels to polish it. Use the arbor with a leather wheel to get a high polish. Go



home with a cabochon you can use for a pendant. The workshop is limited to 4 members. The workshop fee is \$20.00, payable in advance to jetsorensen@gmail.com via Zelle.

PRONG SETTING CABOCHONS

Sunday, May 25, 9 am to 12 noon at the club's Lapidary Shop.

Learn to set a cabochon with prongs by making

and fusing a frame, measure and cut prongs you solder onto the frame. Create a bail and solder it onto the frame. Secure the cabochon with the prongs and go home with a new pendant. The silver used is Argentium, a kind of sterling silver but with a higher fine silver content, making it very slow to tarnish when compared to sterling. The workshop is limited to 4 members. The workshop fee is \$65.00, including silver and a cabochon, payable in advance to jetsorensen@gmail. com via Zelle.

TREE OF LIFE WORKSHOP

FIESTA OF GEMS UPDATE

We are in the midst of getting ready for our pride and joy activity, Fiesta of Gems, from June 27 through June 29.

The most important thing for running a successful event is an "all hands on deck" attitude in the membership. We need everyone to volunteer to give a hand.

We need strong folks to help load display cases and other heavy/bulky things at the Lapidary Shop on the setup day, **Friday, June 27, starting at 9 AM**. These volunteers should then help unload and set up at the Veterans Memorial after 10 AM. We also need volunteers during the day to set up tables and chairs and put on tablecloths. Plants will arrive Friday from our main grower, Grace Sato. If you have plants to donate, bring them in Friday afternoon. We need volunteers to help set up the break room and deliver cookie platters to the vendors (more about cookies in the June Nugget.) In addition, we need volunteers for security, making sure that only vendors and CCRMC-approved people get entrance.

On Saturday, June 28, we need volunteers to greet guests outside the lobby, inside the lobby at the welcome table, and at the plant sale, at the Children's area and Grab Bag Sale, on the stage at the Club Table, as security, and as Floates to fill in where needed.

MINERAL REPORT: SOCAL JASPERS

Jasper is a lapidary favorite—tough, richly patterned, and full of color. As a microcrystalline variety of quartz, it's part of the chalcedony family but differs in its opacity and often dramatic inclusions. Jasper forms in a wide range of geological environments and can take on nearly any color or pattern depending on local mineral content, deposition, and volcanic activity.

This stable of the studio forms when silica-rich fluids — often from volcanic ash, hydrothermal fluids, or the chemical weathering of rocks — percolate through cracks, cavities, or porous rocks, and precipitate microcrystalline quartz (chalcedony) over time. Unlike clear quartz which forms at higher temps, chalcedony crystals are microscopic and form under 320 degrees, giving jasper its smooth, soft-looking texture. What makes jasper distinct is the presence of impurities—like iron, manganese, or clay minerals—which give it its rich colors and patterns. Iron oxides (like hematite or goethite) produce reds and yellows, manganese gives black or deep purples, and other elements cause greens, blues, or browns.

Southern California is rich in diverse and col-

lectible jaspers due to lots of volcanic activity, weathering, and currently dry environments. Now, it's important to know that the names below are really marketing terms rather than proper geological terms. But, it'll at least give you a good idea of what you can find when getting out of LA for a short summer road trip:



Mojave Jasper

Found in the Mojave Desert, this jasper can range from red and orange to green and purple, often with banding or brecciated patterns. Its hardness and vivid color make it great for cabochons.



Lavic Jasper

Sourced near Lavic Siding off Route 66, this jasper is known for its bright reds, oranges, and yellows—classic "picture jasper" material with swirls and layers reminiscent of desert landscapes.



Pisgah Jasper

Mined near Pisgah Crater, this material often shows orbicular patterns and wild brecciation, with black, gray, red, and cream tones. A fun challenge for intermediate cutters due to its internal fractures.



Cady Mountains Jasper

From the Cady Mountains near Barstow, this jasper ranges from clean pastel tones to bold polychrome

banding. You'll find poppy jasper types here, with orb-like red spots in contrasting matrices.



Rainbow Ridge Jasper

Technically just outside SoCal near the border with Nevada, but often collected by locals—this jasper features swirling bands of pink, black, gray, and green. Beautiful when polished and suitable for slabs.



Dalmatian Jasper

A misnomer geologically (it's actually an igneous rock with feldspar and arfvedsonite), this speckled black-and-white material is still beloved by lapidaries. It polishes well and takes whimsical shapes. Found throughout the Sierra Nevada foothills.

BENCH TIPS



DRILLING SMALL ITEMS

Small pieces need to be held securely while drilling to prevent them from spinning if the drill catches. Having sliced my fingers occasionally in my younger days, I avoid band-aids now by using flat-jaw pliers or a ring clamp. Pliers also save you if the piece gets hot. Put a little tape over plier jaws if needed to avoid scratches.



DRILLING A STONE

One of the things my students often ask to do is drill a hole through a piece of gemstone. The usual thought is to get a diamond drill, but I've been disappointed with them. I think the reason is that the tip of the drill is just pivoting in the hole and fails to cut well. When it looks like the drill isn't cutting, the tendency is to push with more force. The drill

gets hot, and the diamond grit falls off.

A much better approach is to use a core drill. This is a small hollow tube with a coating of diamond grit at the business end. The diamonds easily carve out a circular arc without undue pressure or heat buildup.

Core drills are readily available from lapidary and jewelry supply companies. They come in sizes as small as 1mm and are very reasonable in price. For instance, a 2mm diameter drill is about \$6.

Chuck the core drill in a drill press, Dremel or Foredom and be sure to keep the drilling zone wet to cool the tool and to flush out debris. Also, if you're drilling a through hole, ease up on the pressure as the drill is about to cut through. Otherwise you may chip off some of the stone surface around the hole.
